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Developing a road map for your revision begins with a systematic approach:

- I. Identify what needs fixing in a manuscript.
- II. Create a scene-by-scene revision plan.
- III. Perform an overall prose polish.

Quick read/General impressions-- address draft comments/notes, mark anything that yanks you out of the novel or causes your attention to wander, characters that bother and action that doesn't make sense, lackluster scenes, scenes that need clarification, *scenes you like, if something feels but you don't know why.
